Dear Parent / Carer,




Shrove Tuesday or Pancake Day

LINCOLN NEWS...

We have had a busy term at Lincoln, with lots of exciting things happening! We have been involved in many different activities, trips and charity days, which have all been a huge success.

College Visits

At the beginning of this term, the Year 11 students went on a visit to Lincoln College. The Year 11 were split into two groups to ensure they would be able to go to the course that they wanted to visit. Each group had a tour around the college and were able to go to each of the course that they were thinking of starting in September, providing them with the opportunity to learn more about them. When the students came back, they said that they found the trip really useful as for some it solidified their choice of course. Recently, one of the students went on a visit to Linkage College to have a look round. She really enjoyed her trip and has since been talking about it. This was a really positive

visit for her and allowed her to get to know the college before she goes in September. In the past few weeks, we have had visits from Hill Holt Wood and Riseholme College who have come to talk to the students about their college and the courses they can provide. In turn, two of our students went on a visit to YPLP for the morning. They had a tour around the college and were able to ask any questions that they had. These visits have been really useful in helping the students to think about where they would like to go as well as what course they would like to do.

WOW

In WOW the students have been focusing on nature. In the first session, they looked at growing their own plants and their family trees. The students explored the concept of aspirations and goals by exploring different topics relating to nature. In the first session, the students made their own seed pot out of recycled paper.







Once they had made these, they then planted their seeds and put them outside in the sun. They then discussed family trees and discussed what they are. The students were then given the task of creating a Pilgrim tree of everyone in the school. This was really effective as it got the children thinking about their own families and how their family trees work.

At the end of the session, one of the students said that they wanted to explore their own family tree and find out more about their family and relatives at home. In the

following session, the student created their own bird feeders from a paper cup, honey and bird seed. They used the honey to help the seeds stick to the cup. The students had free reign of the design and were able to explore the best way for the birds to be able to eat the seeds. One of the students said that by placing sticks around the bottom

of the feeder it would allow the birds to be able to sit and eat the seeds.

As it was pancake day this week, the students made pancakes and topped them with their favourite topping. The students really enjoyed doing this as they were able to experiment with different toppings. Although, it was clear that the favourite amongst the students was golden syrup.



DEAR



At Pilgrim we have started an initiative called 'Drop Everything and Read'. This is supported by research which shows that reading for as little as 10 minutes every day has an important impact on how well a child does at school. It is also thought to relieve stress and improve empathy. This initiative has become a big part of our school day on a Friday as we read every Friday morning for 15 minutes.

The main aim for DEAR is to introduce reading more into the school day. As part of DEAR we have created a display which shows what books that the staff are reading. This is updated every half term. This is useful for providing students with recommendations for books they may want to read. We also have also created a display which includes the children's thoughts about reading and their

favourite books. The students have then been given recommendations based on the books that they have chosen. We have found this really useful as often the students do not know what to read. As a result of this there have also been more discussions about reading, which has led to the students finding out about books they may not have heard of. We have also introduced magazines on a Friday morning, which have been a huge hit with the students. The magazines have allowed those students that find reading difficult to find something that they are interested in. This has really helped them get involved with DEAR and overcome the barrier of reading.





Cash for Kids Clothing Collection

We have recently joined an initiative called Cash for Kids, who work alongside Lincs FM. They work to help improve the lives of disadvantaged children and young people in our local area, who may be affected by poverty, illness, neglect or additional needs. Their main aim is to ensure that all children are able to achieve their full potential and live life to the full.



As a school we have been collecting clothes to raise money for their charity. The collection company came to collect the clothes on the 11th of March. They are then weighed, and a total will be calculated depending on how much the clothes weigh. This has been really successful with us collecting a lot of bags between the bases, which will then be used to raise money for the charity. It has been a fantastic opportunity for the students to learn about the importance of recycling, whilst also raising funds to benefit the local community.

Hopeful Hero Display

Last year, all the bases voted for their hopeful heroes. One of these hopeful heroes is Marcus Rashford. At Lincoln base, Sally-Anne has created a display showcasing his life whilst also linking it to our hopeful curriculum.

The display follows his life from a child when his family had very little money to his life now, as a footballer for Manchester United. It shows how he has gone through really difficult times but has come out the other side, by continuing to show strength and motivation to better himself. The display also includes quotes of things Marcus has said, that are important to remember in our lives.



The hope curriculum has been used to show how his life and the events that have happened in his life can be linked to the hope words. It shows that even though life may be difficult there is always a glimmer of hope. The use of the hope words on the display helps the students to remember that everything has a positive, even if we may see it as a negative. It's the same for Marcus' life, even though he went through difficult times he continued to work hard to get where he is now. As a result, this has been a great new addition to Lincoln base and has shown that students that it will get better it just takes time.

HOME TAUGHT...

What an amazing term it's been for students who receive their lessons at home! Many of you have made incredible progress this term and continue to astound and delight with what you can achieve. Great ikigai and sisu!

We continue to grow as a service and have recruited even more dedicated teachers and pastoral staff to make sure you get the best possible Pilgrim experience you can.

This term several of you joined us on a visit to Woodside Wildlife Park and to our city visit to York. For many of you this is a big step and we are all proud of you. Many of you have also taken part in British Science week, receiving packs to use with your teachers or on your own around the theme of 'Growth'. I am looking forward to hearing about and hopefully seeing pictures of your Giant Sunflowers and bee friendly wildflower patches.

Year 11s are busy preparing for their future and have worked hard on their mock exams and I know you are all working hard towards your Summer exams. Good Luck! Talking of futures, we have a first for one of our home taught students. A fabulous opportunity to complete a work experience placement.

For example, if they need anything different in the classroom or if they need anything specific to enable them to access learning, these are things I would help with. I love the challenge of making provision work for pupils so that they can get the most out of their time at Pilgrim. I've been working with pupils with SEND for nearly 15 years now, and have learned a lot about needing to create flexible provision to meet need.'

Hi, I am Elena. I have been working at The Pilgrim School since 2018 and I am now the assistant SENDCo. I support Becky on all things SEND. I am involved in completing referrals to outside agencies, corresponding with these agencies and mainstream schools, and overall ensuring that our pupils with SEND get the correct support to allow them to successfully access learning.





BRITISH SCIENCE WEEK ...

Our 3rd British Science week took place across all of Pilgrim School, from 14th to 18th March. The topic for this year was growth. Students planted seeds of cacti, cress, comparing their rate of growth, bee friendly flower bombs, and other assorted plants. The weather was lovely and we managed to do this outside in the grounds at the bases. KS3 students took great pride in finding places to plant so the seeds could find sunlight.

There were Science quizzes in which the teachers inflicted a devastating loss on the student team at Baumber!



At Amber Hill there was also a quiz (where students took pride in beating Scott), and they made spaghetti and marshmallow structures - growing the tallest structure. Some falling over and lots of left over marshmallow eating at the end.

In Lincoln the KS3 group planted anything resembling a seed and we are awaiting the outcome!

Also some indicator art was done and the new electricity kits were used across bases.



Activities were not just confined to base as students in the home took part as well as in the community (growing packs were delivered to Amber Hill residents). One eager student in the home looked at cress growing over time. Luckily it grows quicker than a cactus.



The week was a resounding success and there was positive feedback from all.

- Whilst we do not have a uniform policy, we do ask that pupils come to school appropriately dressed to be able to engage in all subjects and any practical activities that may be taking place that day.

GCSE EXAMS - SUMMER 2022

Year 11 examinations will soon be upon us. We know that pupils all over the country will have had variations in their schooling over the past two years, a mild understatement. The following adjustments have been made for core subjects:

In mathematics the content that can be assessed is essentially unchanged. However, pupils will have access to an exam board supplied support sheet that contains key information such as formulas.

In English Language There has been a pre-release which has told students that in Paper 2, they will be comparing a piece of 21st Century Autobiographical writing and a 19th Century essay. In the writing section, they will be writing an article.

Spoken Language: Does not have to be recorded and can be done remotely and/or just with one adult.

In English Literature The pupils have been allowed to 'drop' one element of either Paper (so either Poetry Anthology, 19th Century Text or Modern Novel). Individual pupils can make this choice.

In Science for both Foundation and Higher paper some knowledge and practical content has been removed from all 6 papers. However, this is not the same content for Foundation and Higher. Each year 11 student has been given a list of the content for Paper 1 and Paper 2 for Biology, Chemistry and Physics as well as a guide to the pages from the revision guide to focus on. They have also been given a list and information of all the required practicals that may be examined on each paper.

This year it is not mandatory for the students to have completed all of the practical work, and when teaching practical work the exam board has also suggested the use of video to support this.

In addition, for the Physics exam all students will receive a formula sheet for all equations needed and students have been given this in advance too.

The examination period will run from Monday 16th May – Thursday 23rd June 2022.

The official date for Year 11s to leave school is **Friday 24th June 2022** which will be our annual Celebration Day. Therefore, if students have completed all outstanding coursework and portfolios they can leave on that date.

In addition, a contingency exam day has been arranged by the Examinations Awarding Bodies which all students need to be aware of. The contingency day has been put in place in the event of local or national disruption to exams and in case the Joint Council for Qualifications decide that they need to postpone an exam and rearrange for a later date to allow students a fair and equal chance.

The date that has been set aside as the 'contingency' day is **Wednesday 29th June 2022**. **ALL** students must ensure they remain available from the date of their first exam until Wednesday 29th, should the awarding body need to invoke its contingency plan. The decision is not a school decision and applies to all students in all schools.

Taxis are in place until the 24th June 2022. Students will be expected to continue attending on their normal days during exams, unless advised otherwise. Fully supported revision and practice of exam techniques will be continued up to the date of each exam. Students will also be supported to ensure they meet the objectives of portfolios and coursework so that they can achieve the highest possible grade.

Examinations will be held at our Amber Hill, Baumber or Lincoln Base. Students must be in school, ready to start by **9am** for morning exams and **12.45pm** for afternoon exams.

Additional taxis for exam days will be requested for students who normally travel by taxi and are sitting an exam on a non-timetable day.

A letter regarding arrangements for receiving results will be sent to parents at a later date.
