Dear Parent / Carer,

GOVERNORS' UPDATE...

In recent days I have taken my new puppy, Timmy, to his first Puppy Socialisation class. His name, Timmy, reflects his personality, timid.

So, I had no idea how he was going to react to being off the lead with other puppies and their owners in a field he wasn't familiar with. I knew I needed to stay calm and caring to give him the confidence to give it a go. I had to carry him to the field as he refused to walk there but with lots of patience and encouragement (treats!) I was able to get him into the field ok. The leader of the group was calm, caring and patient with Timmy (and with me!). I took off Timmy's lead and joined the rest of the adults walking around the perimeter of the field with all the puppies off the lead. So many different sizes of puppies and personalities! Where was Timmy in all this? He was simply sitting in the same position by the entrance (looking more and more like a baby lamb!) – not too nervous or anxious but quietly taking it all in. On my second circuit of the field, I observed other puppies showing an interest in Timmy but with no real engagement from them other than a quick sniff. As I walked past him this time, he decided to follow me and started to walk round the paddock; he stayed close but gradually seemed to enjoy being there, joining in a bit of the sniffing towards the end of the session. Next time we go he will have a better understanding of what will happen so hopefully will join in straight away. But the crucial thing was to listen to Timmy and not have unrealistic expectations of what he was going to achieve.

Not just in school, but whenever we face new situations, it can feel overwhelming for everyone involved – (not just the newbie!), but with calm and caring support, we can take tiny steps and gain confidence to become more involved socially. And then in turn we can become the calm and caring supporter encouraging new people to be themselves.

Our students will move on to new environments; not knowing anyone, not knowing what to expect. But with care and support they can step forwards at their own pace.

I love the Red Arrows Display Team! They are such a talented, confident group of pilots having trained and worked so hard as individuals, but the essence of their displays is all about teamwork and keeping one another safe. And when you reflect on the amount of background staff essential to this team (the maintenance crew members, the administrative staff and the pilots' families too) then they are as important as the pilots themselves for the team display to appear effortless!

Everywhere at The Pilgrim School there are individuals working hard in their own situations BUT together they are all contributing to the overall care and hope filled essence and ethos of our school. We need each other. It doesn't matter whether we are students, parents, carers, staff, or governors; learning in the home situation or in a base situation; – together we are the amazing Pilgrim School. It is a genuine privilege to be a governor – and gives me 'goosebumps' to be so proud to be involved.

E-SAFETY....

Hi,

Another busy few months – but thankfully in a positive way!

All staff should by now have completed an annual Cyber Security training course via the Every platform. Hopefully it was informative, without upping the fear factor. It also means that all our pupils can seek positive advice from any member of staff if they have any online safety worries.

By the end of this term, the majority of student H Drives will be switched to Read Only (unless studying optional ICT). Next year, all work will be saved on the students' dedicated Sharepoint site, so can be accessed and worked on anywhere.

Online Safety Groups have been set up in all bases and have had their inaugural meetings. With the new KCSIE guidelines, Online Safety has now become a major element of safeguarding. It makes sense to combine these with the Pupil Forum to increase participation of students and staff.

The main common points are:

Students are aware of safety/privacy restrictions on apps but choose not to use them as they "take the fun" out of it, and want people to see their posts or "what's the point?" They also have less fear around privacy as they've "never known any different".

There is now an Online Safety board in every base, with up to date links via QR codes to current threats, and news and views from CEOP/NCA, NSPCC and Childline. Students are being encouraged to register with Childline; it is anonymous and they can post on forums, receive regular updates on threats/scams etc.

Whilst acknowledging that not every Parentmail is appropriate for discussion, we would like to encourage you to discuss the Online Safety output with your children. A student-friendly poster version of each Online Safety Parentmail will also be added to the board when updates are sent out.

We are also discussing the best way get the same messages over with home educated students.

HOPE CURRICULUM...

'We have already taken many steps. Now it is time to take a leap'.

(Malala Yousafzai, December 10th, 2014)



Malala is another of The Pilgrim School's 'Hopeful Heroes'. She has been chosen because she teaches us about the principles of Hope through her story. She has a goal, to make education a right for girls all over the world. She finds different pathways to meet this goal, by finding many different ways to speak, write and campaign for girl's rights. She has also shown agency, by being determined not to be silenced even after being targeted by the Taliban for her beliefs.



However, Malala did not become 'Hopeful' without the support of her Father (Ziauddin Yousafzai). He was, and is, her **cheerleader**. She said:

'I am lucky that I have an amazing feminist father and I say that he was a feminist before he even knew the word feminist, he was not just preaching about the equality of women. He was actually doing it. He ensured that I get my education, that I get treated the same way as my brothers get treated. And there were so many other young girls insightfully who wanted to speak out and who were speaking out initially. But their brothers and their fathers stop them from speaking out. And what's different in my story is that my father did not stop me. It's as simple as that' (Malala, Desert Island Discs, 14th February 2021).

A key element of the Hope curriculum is that we all need cheerleaders and supporters to lend us Hope when we need it and to guide us towards being able to have goals, pathways and agency. Hope isn't wishful thinking. It is in fact quite the opposite. It is an active state of mind which can be developed when we are supported by those who can lend us Hope whilst we develop ours.

Returning to the quotation at the start of this piece, Malala says 'we have already taken many steps'. Steps come before leaps. Steps are the small beginnings of pathways to a goal. Malala reminds us that with the support of others, we can have Hope.


DofE...

This has been a year of change and development for DofE at the Pilgrim School, we have taken the decision where possible to integrate DofE into your students Pilgrim life. Through this decision we currently have more students



signed up to and working towards their DofE Bronze than ever before, whilst adding another 3 students to our ever-growing list of successful Bronze participants which now totals 18 Bronze DofE Awards presented.

The Bronze DofE Award is split into 4 sections, including Volunteering, Physical and Skill. The participant has to complete a minimum of 1 hr a week of each section for 3-6months. The fourth section is Expedition over 2days/1night.





FIRST AID...

A few years back as a school we made the decision to add first aid to the list of qualifications our students gain, furthering this we decided to train them to the same level as our staff. Since then we have trained 27 students in Level 3 award in Emergency First Aid at Work, 10 of which were this year's cohort. We train our students alongside our staff to improve the empowerment felt by them and exaggerate that we really do train them to the same level.

They all engaged amazingly and took the bluntness and physicality of the course incredibly well. The structure of the course includes practical and knowledge-based assessments. I always include some real world/ less cheesy examples which can be quite hard hitting (as first aid can be sometimes) which they all took well and at times shared their knowledge and experiences.

During our course, I run a 1 minute compressions only CPR on the Resusci Annes which gives a live score which they all passed, most scored 90%+ and 2 of our students even managed 100%.

CAREERS WEEK...

July 3rd - July 7th

We have had a fantastic start to the launch of our new Careers programme. This has included using Tuesday morning tutorials for discussing a different career each week. We are using the website mypathcareersuk.com/job-of-the-week which presents a different job each week in a short upbeat video (two minutes) and gives the essential information of what the job entails, progression, salary, skills, qualifications looked for. It is an excellent website for students to explore with peers, family and friends and has a video bank of over 120 jobs at different levels across the range of sectors. I do recommend parents and teachers working with students in the home or at a base give this website a go to promote thinking and discussion around post 16.

Neil organised a superb line-up of visitors to the bases to talk about careers. These talks could also be accessed online for students in the home. The line-up included Sergeant Gemma Yarwood from RAF Waddington talking about military careers, Laura Blackwell talking about careers in IT and cyber security. Careers Service representatives visited bases to give a very thought-provoking insight into the labour market, social media and jobs for the future. A United Lincolnshire Hospital Trust visitor provided a very wide and interesting introduction to the 350 different types of jobs found in nursing, health and social care. This is predicted to be one of the growth sectors for the future with jobs for everyone at each level. Lincoln and Boston Colleges provided careers specialists to talk specifically about apprenticeships. Many of our students are really interested by this pathway and it was great to see and hear them asking questions and engaging with the visitors. We have a presentation on agriculture and farming still to come but intend to continue to invite visitors throughout the year to talk about their experiences and careers. A highlight of the week was a visit from Jaime Claughton, an ex-Pilgrim pupil who now works for Vippies, a business that provides health and wellbeing programmes with therapy dogs. Jaime came with her employer and a gang of therapy dogs to talk about her post Pilgrim experience, her typical day now and her love of the job.

Throughout the week teaching staff have delivered an impressive array of lessons showing how their subject links to different careers. Next time students say "why do we need to do?" we have the answer at our fingertips and a bank of information and illustrative tasks to draw on. This makes learning so pertinent, relevant and real (resources can be found teams/whole school/careers/subjects).

<u>Update – Other Careers matters</u>

The school is working towards attaining the Gatsby 8 Benchmark Framework for Careers

We have obtained the first two benchmarks of having careers policies and a programme in place that is judged to be robust, relevant and up to date.

Pupils benefit greatly from the personal and pastoral support they are given to seek post 16 opportunities.

We are expanding our careers programme to include more work-related tutorials, workshops, talks, visitors and visits so pupils experience the world of work. All three bases attended the Lincolnshire Show on Thursday 22nd June. It was a very hot and sunny day so the slushies and ice cream available were very needed.




DISCOVERY DAY...




This year was the first year as a school we have run a discovery day across all three bases on the same day. The theme for discovery day this year was to create a sculpture representing our culture.




