

WOW Careers Activities

This term two Lincoln pupils had the opportunity to experience work in the care sector by visiting along with staff a local care home for an afternoon. They sat with some of the residents and did some colouring with them. Both pupils were outstanding, they demonstrated compassion, understanding, empathy and were not phased even when one of the residents became distressed. One of the residents they sat with, a 77 year-old, who was hard to understand, tried to talk to both students and they actively listened and had great little chats with her. At one point the resident asked a pupil to hold her hand and give her a hug; without a second thought and with permission from her carer, the pupil demonstrated compassion and put her arm around the elderly lady and reassured her that all was OK. Changes to DEAR

As you may know, we do DEAR (Drop Everything And Read) in tutor time every Friday morning. Pupils are encouraged to bring a book or magazine of their choice to read for 20 minutes at the start of the day. We know that not everyone enjoys reading or they may find it difficult. That is why we have made some changes to DEAR this term. We will have two classrooms available during tutor time: one for those who bring their book and enjoy having 20 minutes of peace to sit and read quietly; the second room will have a member of staff reading a book aloud. Pupils will be able to follow along with the text while the teacher reads.



This also has the positive effect of us being able to monitor and filter activity, along the same lines as our school laptops. It's extremely pleasing to report that there's has not been one single instance of a student trying to access an inappropriate website or app on this system.

As part of INSET day in January, we had a session working on a virtual E-safety Escape Room run by Lincolnshire Police. It was extremely entertaining, and highlighted just how easy it can be to be compromised when online.

MY PILGRIM EXPERIENCE...

A former pupil account:

Hi, I'm Becca, I attended The Pilgrim School in 2021-2022! When I arrived at the Pilgrim School I had problems with anxiety and spent the majority of my time mute. I felt like my world was crumbling and that the world itself stopped at the walls of my bedroom. Each aspect of my life felt like another bucket of water added to the tank I was drowning in. When I first began at the Pilgrim I didn't go beyond the front corridor for a long time. I didn't go to classes and I kept entirely to myself. What surprised me was how understanding the Pilgrim were about this. Everyday I woke up feeling pathetic and then everyday they would remind me that I wasn't. They gave me the bricks to build myself back together and they appreciated that that was going to take longer than a day.

Once I began going into the actual classes I felt like myself again. I had always been largely into my academics and Pilgrim allowed me to regain this love without feeling suffocated by stress. Even through my GCSEs I was able to keep a level head and they supported me the whole way through. I ended up passing all of my GCSEs and going on to study A-Level English literature and language, Politics and Sociology; which I now have predicted grades of AAA* in. I am doing these at a college rather than a sixth form as we realised this would be a much better environment for me, showing that sometimes all it takes is a few adjustments for you to get where you want to be. Throughout my A-Levels I've managed to keep a steady part-time job at a bar and have had an active role in my college's student union putting lots of my focus on student mental health and wellbeing.

I'm also really excited for September as I have a conditional offer to study criminology with a placement year at Loughborough University and I hope to go into victim support work when I have finished this. I am at a point in my life I never believed I would have got to and I am unapologetically myself without feeling bad about that.

The Pilgrim School, unlike previous schools I had attended, never tried to make me something I wasn't. They never made me feel guilty or upset over my emotions and weaknesses. They helped me build positivity on who I already was and reminded me I was strong, a notion I have continued to carry with me. I am not saying you will wake up one morning, leap out of bed and be absolutely perfect. There are still some days I panic and others where I just feel like I can't do it. But with every fall I get back up and I talk about it instead of bottling up and letting it worsen. I am able to recognise that I am in no way perfect and I can smile about that.

New Section of Website

If you have not already done so, check out the new 'Together At Home' section on our school website (https://www.pilgrim.lincs.sch.uk/page/?title=%2ANEW%2A+Together+at+Home&pid=176) This section is intended to support, enhance and enrich learning. It is beneficial and useful for pupils who cannot get into a base for one reason or another and provides an opportunity for pupils, families, carers and friends to get involved in discussions and activities that are a part of school life.

In the 'Together At Home' careers post section you will find information and links to work experience opportunities, college events and YouTube videos from MyPath who post short videos about various careers. This page also links you to the Careers & Post-16 section of the website which provides information about local colleges and post-16 placements and apprenticeships. There are interactive quizzes to identify career interests and links to hundreds of short career talks and videos to help pupils make up their mind about next career progression steps.

In the 'Together at Home' section you will also find a challenging programme of discussion points and tasks and activities from the PSHE and Careers curriculum at key stages 3 and 4. Recent discussion topics have included questions such as 'Are New Year resolutions a waste of time?', 'Would money or happiness be more motivating in a job?', 'Is access to the internet a human right?', 'Do we celebrate differences enough?' and 'In general which is better the book or film?'

Through the PSHE tasks, key stage 3 pupils have learnt about the importance of sleep and being physically active, features of a balanced lifestyle, the importance of making the most of leisure time and having a balance between online and other activities. Topics next term will cover healthy relationships, developing, sustaining and ending relationships and being a good friend. Meanwhile, key stage 4 have studied characteristics of committed relationships, rights and protection of marriage and civil partnerships and protected characteristics against discrimination. Coming up next term will be romance and attraction, managing intimate relationships, personal safety and sexual health.

EXAMS UPDATE ...

In January we held our Year 11 mock exams fortnight across all 3 bases, which was a great opportunity for pupils to experience what will happen in the "real" GCSE examinations, which start in just a few weeks time. It seems to come around so quickly each year!

Most Year 11 students will be sitting exams at their respective Pilgrim base, however we do have some students sitting exams in the home or at their mainstream school. Individual exam timetables have been sent out to pupils in the last few weeks so everyone should be aware of when their exams are taking place.

Some key things to note regarding GCSEs:

- Exams run from Thursday 9th May Friday 14th June 2024 (apart from the external assessment for Art which takes place during w/c 22nd April).
- Pupils should remain available until Wednesday 26th June which is the exam boards contingency date in case
 any exam has to be rearranged due to national emergencies or incidents (i.e. severe weather). Please bear
 that in mind when arranging holidays etc.
- Pupils who attend a base should continue to attend for their normal timetable on days with no exams.
- On exam days pupils only attend for the morning or afternoon session that the exam is in.
- Taxis will be amended by Pilgrim to reflect this.
- The last day for Year 11s is Friday 21st June, which is our annual Celebration Day. Attendance between your final exam and 21st June is not expected unless you have course work etc. to finish off.
