

		<p>LK expressed a concern that the data showed that 50% of pupils were not on target for Maths. LK explained that the GCSE mocks were much harder this year and coupled with a re-working of target grades could account for this. PS confirmed that the Maths papers had changed and a number of the questions were worded differently and a number of the pupils although they knew the answers were unsure of how the question related to their knowledge. PS confirmed that this was the same across many schools and had skewed the data.</p> <p>LK explained that the SEN cohort are of general concern with 27% not on track in English; 86% in Maths and 54% in science (although Governors should bear in mind that the numbers are small and so therefore 1 pupil can make a large difference to stats). 9 out of 12 pupils in Maths are doing entry level courses which effects the stats as entry level courses sit below the target grades generated from the online tests.</p> <p>LK explained that 42% of KS3 pupils are not on track for Maths and 27% are not on track for English. LK asked Governors to take into account the small number of pupils at KS3 and how this can affect percentages.</p> <p>LK informed the committee that collating data for pupils taught in the home continued to be an issue. Currently 17 pupils are being taught in the home but only 4 had a full data set at the point of PC2. LK explained that there are various reasons for this such as pupils who won't leave their bedrooms or engage so therefore getting baseline assessments alone is very difficult. LK explained that there is a member of staff who now co-ordinates the pupils being taught in the home (she was off sick during the data collation period for PC2) and that all pupils including 1:1 in the home have IPP's.</p> <p>LK explained that the Year 11 projections were affected by missing data and also the 80% A* - G forecast with general studies may be optimistic. However the nature of the General Studies paper means that more pupils can access the paper as there is no requirement for specific timetabled classes.</p>
